THIRD LATIN AMERICAN REGIONAL CONFERENCE (ISME/SADEM)

Mar del Plata, Argentina, 11-15 September 2001

The Third Latin American Regional Conference organized by the Argentine Society for Music Education (SADEM), under the umbrella of ISME, was successfully held in Mar de Plata City, a summer resort located 400 km from the capital city, Buenos Aires.

'Action and Research in Music Education' was the reason to call together people from different countries including Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Israel, Australia, Mexico, Venezuela, and Argentina. Delegates presented papers in the two official languages, Spanish and Portuguese.

People had the privilege to share this experience with ISME President John Drummond, who in turn had the chance to learn more about life and Music Education in another area of the southern hemisphere than his own.

Plenary sessions were distinguished, among others, by the presence of Ramon Santos (The Philippines), Eugenia Costa-Giomi (Canada), Alda Oliveira (Brazil) and Ana Lucia Frega (Argentina).

One plenary session, under the headline of 'All about ISME', was designed for the audience to learn more about ISME. Participants were all Latin American music educators actively involved in ISME such as Board members Liane Hentschke (Brazil) and Dina Grätzer (Argentina). The panel also included Commission members Liliana Acuña (Argentina) from Music Therapy and Orlando Musumeci (Argentina) from Education of the Professional Musician. Also taking part was Ana Lucia Frega, a former ISME President and, of course, the current ISME President, John Drummond.

Papers were categorized as research and communications, and embraced four main areas: a) Music education at all three school levels; b) Training of the professional musician: performers, composers, musicologists and other technical options; c) Special music education: music therapy and special relations among music and medicine and d) Informal or community music education.

Seventy papers and workshops were presented in four parallel sessions with the variety of themes and focuses the most challenging and enriching aspect of this conference. Evening concerts were given as well as a lovely, informal 'Latin American feast' where people shared their traditional music and dances in a relaxed atmosphere.

ISME CONFER

One of the great advantages of being an ISME member is the opportunity to attend the Society's World Conference every two years.

Since 1953 tens of thousands of music educators have met in countries as diverse as Finland. South Africa and Poland, and cities with populations as different as Seoul and Canberra. Variations in climate from the hot afternoon thunderstorms of Tampa, Florida to the sunny winter days of Pretoria have given Conference delegates a close encounter of our varied world, an added bonus to the pleasure and excitement of attending an international gathering of like-minds.

Bergen, the host city for the 2002 World Conference, is another place that will long be remembered by delegates, and for a variety of reasons. Situated on the west coast of Norway, it is an enchanting city to visit with its charming harbour, narrow streets lined with delightful old wooden houses dating back centuries, and surrounding mountains.

The city was founded a thousand years ago and, with its proximity to the fjords of Norway and other spectacular sightseeing trips, it will undoubtedly prove to be a memorable place for a conference. To help delegates enjoy as much of the area as possible, the Conference organisers have allocated a day mid-week in the program for visitors to tour the city and region.

One of the not-to-be-missed visits for delegates will be Troldhaugen, the home of Nina and Edvard Grieg. Only 15 minutes by car from Bergen, Troldhaugen is visited by some 130,000 people a year and is one of the most delightful places for anyone interested in music. The estate consists of the house where the Griegs spent every summer from 1885 to 1907 (the year of Edvard's death), the composer's hut with its glorious

views on the edge of a lake, a 200 seat concert hall, a simple tomb by the lake containing the ashes of Edvard and Nina, and the Museum itself, housing a permanent exhibition, multimedia room and café. In the multimedia room, visitors can view a presentation in a variety of languages, where Grieg's own writings have been used as the commentary, interspersed with his music.

The closing date for applications to present papers at most of the commissions has now closed, however, the *Commission for Music in Special Education* is now inviting contributions.

Details are as follows:

The ISME Commission on Music in Special Education, Music Therapy, and Music Medicine invites contributions related to the Seminar theme, Community, Creativity, and Culture: Connections in Music in Special Education, Music Therapy and Music Medicine.

The Commission wishes to encourage proposals of participation in the Seminar to be held in Scandinavia, August 6-11, 2002 and in the Special Session of the 25th ISME World Conference to be held August 11-16, 2002.

Submissions for consideration must comply with the following conditions:

- 1 The presentation may be an oral summary of a research paper, a demonstration with slides or videotapes, a workshop, a panel discussion or a poster session. Each presentation should be 30-45 minutes in length followed by a question and answer period. PRO-POSAL DEADLINE is 1 December 2001. (Please indicate the type of equipment needed.)
- **2** Papers (not exceeding 2000 words and accompanied by an abstract not exceeding 200 words) and detailed descriptions of demonstrations and presentations should be submitted in three copies in English, typed in double-space format, and on computer disc (PC Word format preferred).

3 The following must appear at the top of the first page:

- a) the name and complete address of the person(s) submitting the proposal;
- b)the statement "This paper/de-monstration/presentation is submitted for the Seminar in Scandinavia August 2002, and/or the Special Sessions at the 25th ISME World Conference, August 2002, Bergen, Norway".

(Please state whether the proposal is for the Seminar, the Special Sessions, or both.)

- **4** Proposals must address the theme of the Seminar. Criteria for acceptance include: relevance of the presentation to the theme; original research; scientific rigor; clear scholarly investigation and writing; bibliography; clearly understandable English expression.
- **5** A short curriculum vitae should be sent with the proposal.
- **6** It is a condition for the acceptance of proposals that the writer will present it in person, and that the copyright is vested in ISME. It is also a condition that, if selected, the writer will attend the entire Seminar and/or Conference.
- 7 Proposals may be mailed (postmarked AIRMAIL to address below), faxed (+1-303-492-5619), or emailed (as a Word attachment to: montgomj@spot.colorado.edu Janet Montgomery, 3685 Roundtree Ct, Boulder CO 80304, USA
- **8** Everyone who participates formally in an ISME Seminar is required to be or to become a member of ISME.

NOTIFICATION: Writers of selected papers/presentations will be notified in January 2002. Approximately 12-15 papers/presentations will be selected for the Seminar and 3-5 papers/presentations for the World Conference.

ISME is a world-wide organisation embracing all aspects of music education. In the spirit of the ISME Constitution and Bylaws, the Board wants to emphasise how important it is that the ISME leadership reflects the diversity in music and music education in the world. As the Bylaws state: "Every effort shall be made to present a balanced and diverse slate, particularly with respect to geography". Balance also concerns age, gender, expertise and experience.

The present Board is responsible for the election. In accordance with the

ISME Bylaws, the Board has appointed the following Nominating Committee to solicit and review nominations for President-Elect and Members-At-Large of the Board 2002-2004:

- Shinobu Oku (Japan)
- Freddy Sanchez (Venezuela)
- Joan Therens (Canada)

The Nominating Committee shall present a slate "of not more than two candidates for each office to be filled". The Board has encouraged the Nominating Committee to seek two candidates for each position, in other words two candidates for the position as President-Elect, and 24 candidates for the 12 positions as Members-At-Large of the Board.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I invite all ISME members - individuals and groups - to involve themselves as soon as possible in identifying and nominating candidates for the various positions. You will find all the technical information you need to participate in the nomination process on the enclosed nomination form.

HOW TO NOMINATE

Use this form to submit a nomination for ISME President-Elect or Member-At-Large of the ISME Board of Directors. In each case the term of office will begin at the conclusion of the biennial conference at which he or she is elected. The President-Elect shall serve for a term of two years, shall then automatically succeed to the office of President for a term of two years, shall then automatically succeed to the office of Past President for a term of two years, and may not be reelected. Members-At-Large of the Board of Directors shall serve for a term of two years and may be re-nominated and re-elected for a subsequent term of two years. No member may then be reelected (except as an officer or as provided in the Bylaws) until at least two years have elapsed.

Each ISME member is eligible to nominate not more than two

candidates for President-Elect and not more than two candidates for each Member-At-Large position on the Board of Directors. Use a separate form for each nominee.

Part I must be completed by the ISME member submitting a nomination. **Part II** must be completed by the ISME member seconding the nomination. **Part III** must be completed by the person being nominated. This form, together with a curriculum vitae for the nominee and a personal statement, must be received by **JUNE 20, 2002**.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION BY THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

must have a high academic standard;

- must have taken an active part in ISME activities;
- must possess a strong personality and leadership skills;
- must possess a spirit of generosity; sociability; communication skills;

- must be able, and have the ability, to work for the Society.

MEMBER-AT-LARGE

The nominee must:

- be a member of ISME during the current biennium and for at least two complete membership biennia preceding the current biennium;
- have established strong identification with the Society;
- have established a record of excellence in some field of music education;
- have established a record of service to the Society;
- be willing and able to devote the necessary time to the office

ISME Secretary-General 1992 - 2001

By the time this newsletter is published, Joan Therens will have left her position in the ISME leadership team. Instead of addressing the world-wide ISME membership and writing to you *about* Joan, I have chosen to write *to* Joan, making myself a representative of music educators from all corners of the earth.

Dear Joan,

At first sight, it is difficult to explain why you should become the ISME SG in 1992. It all started two years prior to that. You attended your first ISME Conference in Helsinki in 1990, and were elected a member of the Board of Directors immediately. In Seoul in 1992 you were persuaded to take over as SG. You didn't fight your way to the position, you humbly accepted to place your time and capacities at ISME's disposal.

Almost ten years have passed and you have survived a number of Boards and four and a half Presidents - Yasuharu Takahagi, Lupwishi Mbuyamba, Ana Lucia Frega, myself and half of John Drummond - five very different people who have, in common, relied on you, leant on you, laughed with you and wept with you - in other words, worked very closely with you. We are also, in common, very, very grateful for having had that opportunity.

Every period of ISME's history is special and important. Your decade - the decade in which the whole world has prepared itself for the 3rd millennium - has indeed brought changes to the organisation, changes aimed at making ISME ready to meet the needs of music educators in tomorrow's society. In the midst of all the structural and technical changes you always waved a banner most important to you: ISME needs to be close to its members, to the individual, to each music educator and her or his concerns



and needs. You would never let any President or Board forget that ISME is owned by the members, and our first obligation is to listen to them, care for them and be ready to support them. You always wanted to work *with*, more than working *for*, you would never forget to *respond*, even if the issue seemed tiny, you could not avoid investigating the *potential* in the most farfetched *ideas*, and you would always remember to go back and say *thank you*!

At first sight it may seem difficult to explain why you should become ISME SG so early in your ISME 'career', Joan. At second sight - seeing it all in perspective now - it isn't difficult to explain at all. One doesn't need to have known you for very long before being taken by your very special qualities as a communicator and leader: a unique combination of strengths and weaknesses, stubbornness and second thoughts, courage and awareness.

Dear Joan, I know I am addressing you on behalf of a large and indeed diverse community of music educators in all parts of this marvellous globe of ours, when saying: thank you for all you have given to ISME and to each of us as Secretary General - your time and personal resources, your knowledge and wisdom, your advice and support, and your smile and tears.

GARY MCPHERSON ISME TREASURER 1996 - 2000

When Gary McPherson was asked to take over as ISME Treasurer after Robert Werner in 1996 he was already well known in ISME circles, indeed, not as a handler of dollars and pounds, but as a scholar and practitioner in music education.

Gary stands on very solid feet in his discipline. He is an excellent performer of music, he has broad teaching experience and his research has resulted in books and articles, papers and presentations with the whole world as his arena.

The ISME leadership needs to represent both depth and breadth in music education in order to maintain credible communication with actors in all sectors of the discipline. Gary soon became an asset in that respect, and he contributed actively to the quality of the Board, and Executive Committee discourse in particular, with his broad experience from scholarly work and publishing.

But Gary was appointed Treasurer, not research advisor! Was he able to handle money? Could he advise the Board and Executive on financial matters, and was he capable of taking responsibility for the very limited resources of the Society (it may seem more of a challenge to manage small resources than large!)?

Gary is a very well organised person. He has a logical mind and he is capable of operating simultaneously with short term and long term goals and strategies. He is clear in his views and he is not afraid of letting people know where he stands, but he is indeed a team person who takes responsibility for the conclusions the team arrives at. So, yes, Gary was the right person to manage the ISME pounds and dollars (he never got to the Euro!). He often said he was on "a steep learning curve" and he never failed to honour his predecessor Bob (with whom he worked closely the first year) for being an excellent tutor. Like Bob, and like other wise people, Gary was concerned that



ISME should have a few reserves to take it through possible dark days. One of his last actions as Treasurer was his motion to the Edmonton General Assembly that the reserves established by previous Boards should not be touched unless absolutely necessary, a move that was supported by the membership.

Over the years Gary has worked closely with a large number of ISME members, in commissions and working groups, at seminars and conferences, and, since 1996, on the Board of Directors. I said that Gary is a team person. But he is more than that. Gary is a colleague, a friend and a contributor. Gary takes responsibility. Gary sits down and works things out. Gary always takes the processes he is involved in a few steps forward.

Gary, you started your ISME career as a review editor for the IJME in 1984. In the last year you have been financial advisor to the ISME Board and you may or may not be involved in ISME's money handling in the future. But I wish and hope that you will use your capacities and be visible and audible in the basic work of ISME for many years to come: bringing music education forward - in more than one sense.

Thank you, Gary, for taking care of ISME's financial resources so creatively and for contributing so actively to the work of the Board and Executive since 1996. Thank you also for sharing with ISME colleagues from your colourful palette of knowledge, wisdom and commitment.

ARNOLD BENTLEY 1913-2001



ISME'S NEW SECRETARY GENERAL

The Board is delighted to announce the appointment of Judy Thönell as the Society's new Secretary General. Judy begins her term of office on October 1. For those who don't know Judy, here is some biographical information.

Judy trained at the University of Cape Town in School Music and Instrumental Teaching - she is a pianist and violinist. She spent five years teaching in Zimbabwe, and then fifteen years in Sweden, working in both the elementary/primary and secondary/ High School sectors, and with young instrumental learners and adults. In 1990 she obtained her Masters in Music Education at the University of Stockholm, and then moved to Perth where she worked until recently as Executive Officer at the Callaway International Resource Centre for Music Education (CIRCME). She has traveled widely, presenting at many music education conferences and seminars, and has played a leadership role in the Australian Society for Music Education.

Judy knows the ISME family well. In 1996 she became a member of the Commission for Music in Schools and Teacher Training, and was appointed Co-Chair in 1998. She is widely recognized for her management and personal skills, and her commitment to music education internationally.



The International Society for Music Education has much for which to thank Arnold Bentley who has died aged 88. In 1968 he convened the First International Seminar on Research in Music Education at the University of Reading as a private venture but timed to allow the participants of the Eighth ISME Conference in Dijon, France to attend. By the end of the Seminar the first ISME Commission-the Research Commission-was established with Arnold Bentley as its Chairman. The research life of ISME was thus established, the Research Commission meeting for regular seminars on a biennial basis virtually ever since.

Only two years before, his celebrated Musical Ability in Children and its Measurement had been published, a book that was for many years to be the most cited book in the field. This drew considerable international attention to him and soon the book was to appear in several other languages. Due to his energetic and enterprising networking, the University of Reading was to become the focal point and meeting place for music teachers and researchers. Under his leadership regular research conferences were held at Reading twice yearly from 1966 onwards, and these were to become more formalised into the Society for Research in the Psychology of Music and Music Education seven years later. Under his Chairmanship, and later as its President, Arnold Bentley oversaw the development of the Society's prestigious Journal, Psychology of Music, and the Society firmly established internationally.

It is often overlooked that he was the pioneer of postgraduate training for schoolteachers in England. He developed the first course of this kind, predating others at Birmingham, Manchester and London Universities for whom it operated as an exemplar. For 35 years he focused his energies on supporting and encouraging his student music teachers, for the quality of music in schools was of profound importance to him. His *Music Education: A Point of View*, published in 1982, was his final attempt to redress the balance of music in the classroom away from what he considered to be some of the extravagances of the 1960s and 70s and to do so within a research context.

Many generations of ISME members will recall Arnold Bentley's attendance at their Conferences and his lecturing visits to many European countries as well as USA, Australia and New Zealand. He was made an Honorary Member of ISME in 1982 and other honours were to follow, among them, Honorary Fellowship of the Curwen Institute, and the conferment of the title of Reader at Reading University. On his 75th birthday in 1988, a *Festschrift* was published by ISME (ISME Edition Number Two) to which several internationally eminent researchers contributed. As the first 50 years of music education at the University of Reading approached, the University conferred upon him the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters.

Arnold Bentley was indeed one of the most important father figures of music education research. But he was much more than that. He was an accomplished musician, a caring teacher, and meticulous research supervisor. And in spite of all these accomplishments he remained strangely modest and self-effacing about his achievements. He was, above all else, an enabler and an encourager, and there will be many people across the world who will always remain indebted to him for his friendship and encouragement.

Quite apart from his professional work, Arnold Bentley will stay in our memories as a good and loyal friend. He was loved for just being Arnold, and for his genuine interest in his friends' welfare. I certainly consider myself fortunate to have worked with him for the five years before his retirement and to have him as a friend and confidant. As I sat on the edge of his hospital bed the day he died, he was still the old Arnold, still able to joke, still wanting to know that all was well in the Department at Reading. He radiated a sense of peace and contentment-he told me that he had enjoyed a satisfying and fortunate life.

Our thoughts are with his widow, Nancy, and with his two daughters, Liz and Catherine and son, Tom, and their respective families. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

Evening concert with pianist Leif Ove Andsnes and the Norwegian Youth Symphony Orchestra.

Over the years more than 500 music students have received their orchestral training with this group. Leif Ove Andsnes is Norway's most renowned pianist with a worldwide reputation.

School children on board the sailing ship 'Statsraad Lemkuhl' will arrive in the harbour of Bergen to present their project 'Sailing and Singing'.

They have worked with teachers and musicians along the Norwegian coast to learn the traditions of shanties and sea songs. ISME 2002 delegates will be invited on board to observe the performance and take part in short sailing-and-singing adventures on the fjords, guided by the children.

Wednesday 14 August

Trips within and around Bergen will be organised for Conference delegates. Among those to be offered is one to Troldhaugen, the home of Nina and Edvard Grieg.

Thursday 15 August

World opera premiere of 'Cinderella' based on Roald Dahl's version of the fairytale.

Friday 16 August - Closing Ceremony

Other concerts and projects under development for the conference include:

- Electronics in Popular and Contemporary Music, a project involving a series of events from the Norwegian Concert Institute.
- Projects on Norwegian traditional music in cooperation with the Ole Bull Academy at Voss.
- The Write an Opera Euro-festival 2002. This project, 'How to turn your school class into an opera company', is based on an ongoing cooperative venture between the Royal Opera House in London and Stord/ Haugesund University College.
